Who We Are

The Yale Global Health Ethics Network (GHEN) is a multidisciplinary group of stakeholders from across the University committed to strengthening ethical practice in global health. GHEN provides guidance to students and trainees and serves as a resource for global health research, education, and clinical activities. The Network aims to serve as a resource for the broader Yale University community and its global partners.

How We Came Together

The Global Health Ethics Network (GHEN) was founded in 2021 as part of the Yale Institute of Global Health (YIGH) Global Health Ethics Program at Yale (GHEP). The goal of GHEP is to address the ethical aspects of global health clinical, research and educational activities pursued by Yale students, trainees, faculty and their partners. GHEN was founded to bring together and support Yale faculty and staff working on research and clinical global health ethics across the university. The purpose of the network is to strengthen ethical practice, decision making, and governance across global health research.

What We Do

We continue to build strong-interprofessional relationships and connections between departments in effort to identify areas where ethical guidance, trainings, and other resources could be provided to the university. Through the Global Health Ethics Program, members of the network conduct trainings for Yale Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health students.

GHEN Leads and Fellow



Kaveh Khoshnood, PhD, MPH (GHEN Co-Lead) – *Associate Professor of Epidemiology (Microbial Diseases) and Director of Undergraduate Studies at the Yale School of Public Health.* Dr. Khoshnood is an Associate Professor at the Yale School of Public Health, Faculty Director of the Humanitarian Research Lab, and Co-Director of the Yale Institute for Global Health’s Global Health Ethics Program. His work focuses on the ethical and epidemiological dimensions of global health crises, with an emphasis on humanitarian health, infectious disease prevention, and research ethics. He has extensive experience in HIV prevention research among marginalized populations and is committed to advancing ethical frameworks in global health research and practice.



Tracy Rabin, MD, SM (GHEN Co-Lead) – *Associate Professor of Medicine (General Medicine) and Clinical Associate Professor of Nursing.* Dr. Rabin is the co-director of the YIGH Global Health Ethics Program, as well as co-Lead of the Global Health Ethics Network. She is Director of the Office of Global Health (YSM Department of Internal Medicine), and Director for Global and Community Health in the Yale Primary Care Internal Medicine Residency Program. She co-directs the Makerere University-Yale University (MUYU) clinical education capacity building collaboration which is based in Kampala, Uganda. Her areas of interest include the promotion of ethical and equitable global health academic partnerships, ethical challenges related to short-term clinical work in resource-limited settings, and global health workforce education.



Evan Bowman – *Global Health Ethics Program Fellow.* Evan Bowman is a Yale undergraduate majoring in the History of Medicine, Science and Public Health. She is the Global Health Ethics Program Student Fellow with the Yale Institute for Global Health and has studied global health systems across India, South Africa, and Argentina. Evan is also a Yale Study Abroad Student Outreach Coordinator. Evan plans to pursue a career in medicine and public health leadership focused on advancing ethical, community-centered health systems.

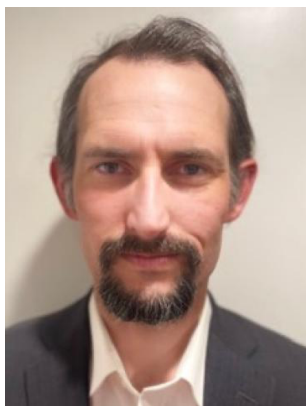
Anjali Bodyk – Associate Director for the YSPH Global Health Concentration). Anjali currently serves as the Associate Director for the YSPH Global Health Concentration and administers the Downs Fellowship. In these roles she enjoys supporting students through academic advisement, facilitating networking opportunities, organizing writing workshops, and leading collaborative international pre-departure preparation and post-return debriefing workshops with faculty and community experts. Her primary interests include building equitable and sustainable global health partnerships with a strong focus in ethics and utilizing best practices in the professional fields of student and academic affairs to provide meaningful guidance to students, faculty, and staff.



Laura Bothwell, PhD, MA – Senior Lecturer, Epidemiology of Microbial Diseases. Dr. Bothwell is an ethicist and historian of public health. Her research examines social, historical, and ethical dimensions of epidemiology with a particular focus on randomized controlled trials (RCTs). Her current book project examines how international and national policies have influenced trial rigor and ethics, protections of vulnerable trial subjects, and participant diversity in RCTs. She also does work on community-based participatory research ethics in low- and middle-income countries.



Nathaniel Camp, MD, MPH – Associate Director for Partnership . Nathan is Associate Director for Partnership Development in the Office of International Affairs at Yale. He takes the lead in managing relationships with multilateral organizations, works with faculty on strategic partnerships, and facilitates the collection of partnership data. He established and manages the Yale Global Emissary program and staffs the Yale Scholars at Risk initiative, which helps welcome scholars, artists, writers, and activists who are no longer able to perform their work in their country of origin. He also serves as Yale’s Fulbright Scholar Liaison.



Daniel Ebbs, MD– *Program Director - Program in Global Participatory Research and Ethics, Assistant Professor of Pediatrics.* Dr. Ebbs is a Pediatric Critical Care Attending at Yale, Co-hub site PI for the Pediatric Pandemic Network, and Director of the Yale MacMillan Center program Global Participatory Research and Ethics. He is affiliate faculty of the Institute for Global Health and Yale Uganda; he also serves on the Yale Global Health Council and is the Assistant Director for the Pediatrics Global Health Track. He is cofounder of MGY (www.mgyaware.org), the Laro Kwo (saving lives) project in Northern Uganda, and the MGY team leader for clinical applications of projects. Dr. Ebbs earned his M.S. concentrating in Community Health with a focus on community based participatory research (CBPR) in global health at the University of New

Mexico, finishing in 2013. His M.S. training focused on the role of community health workers in rural and developing regions around the world, specifically in West Borneo and the NE Peruvian Amazon. His research interests include community participatory research in global health, ethics in global health, pediatric disaster medicine, and prehospital triage in resource limited settings.



Cara Fallon, PhD, MPH – *Senior Lecturer in global health and Director of Undergraduate Studies of the Global Health Studies Program at the Jackson School of Global Affairs.* Her research analyzes the production of health disparities, the marginalization of the elderly and disabled from basic frameworks of health, and chronic disease in global health history. Her book manuscript, *Healthy Forever* (under contract with Yale University Press) examines the history of cultural aspirations and medical innovations for healthy aging in the U.S. and the world. Her work has been supported by the Woodrow Wilson Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the Smithsonian Institutes, and the Consortium for the History of Science, Medicine, and Technology.



Rosana Gonzalez-Colaso, PharmD, MPH – *Associate Professor in the Physician Associate Program, Department of Medicine.* Gonzalez-Colaso has worked to develop educational offerings across professions for students, faculty, and mid-career health professionals. She currently serves in a leadership role for the Equity Research and Innovation Center (ERIC) at the Yale School of Medicine (YSM), and for the Pozen-Commonwealth Fund Fellowship in Health Equity Leadership at the Yale School of Management.

Dini Harsono, MSc – *Program Director, Health Services and Global Research.* Dini Harsono is a program director at the Center for Interdisciplinary Research on AIDS (CIRA), Yale School of Public Health, and a researcher in the Department of Internal Medicine, Yale School of Medicine. She is trained in health psychology with research interests in the social-ecological factors affecting the uptake of evidence-based practices related to HIV, mental health, and substance use, and the ethical considerations in health research. She has extensive experience in designing and applying qualitative and mixed methods approaches in behavioral and clinical research studies, with aims to improve outcomes across the HIV and addiction care cascades.



Karen P Kolb, MFA, APR – *Program for Biomedical Ethics Manager; Program for Humanities in Medicine Manager.* Karen P. Kolb, APR, MFA is the Program Administrator for the Program for Biomedical Ethics. She earned a master's degree in Creative Nonfiction from Lindenwood University and Accreditation in Public Relations from the Public Relations Society of America. Karen is a graduate of the Sherwin B. Nuland Summer Institute in Bioethics and is a member of the Yale Pediatric Ethics Committee. Katherine Kraschel, JD– *Lecturer in Public Health (Health Policy).* Katherine L. Kraschel, JD, is the executive director of the Solomon Center for Health Law and Policy as well as a lecturer in law and clinical lecturer in law at the Yale Law School. She co-teaches the Reproductive Rights and Justice Project Clinic. Kraschel has lectured on and published in the health law and bioethics space, and is particularly interested in assisted reproductive technologies, health policy and gender, and reproductive justice. She completed Harvard Medical School's fellowship in bioethics and serves on Yale New Haven Hospital's Ethics Committee.



Stephen Latham, JD, PhD– *Director of the Yale Interdisciplinary Center for Bioethics.* Stephen R. Latham, JD, PhD is Director of the Yale Interdisciplinary Center for Bioethics. A graduate of Harvard College, Harvard Law School, and UC Berkeley's doctoral program in Jurisprudence, Latham is author of over 150 publications in bioethics and health law. He is the longtime chair of Yale's social/behavioral IRB, and teaches a course on Bioethics and Law which is among the most popular at Yale College.



Mark Mercurio, MD, MA – *Professor Emeritus Pediatrics, Founding Director of the Program for Biomedical Ethics at Yale School of Medicine, and Founding Director of the Pediatric Ethics Program at Yale New Haven Children’s Hospital.*

Mark Mercurio is Professor Emeritus of Pediatrics, Founding Director of the Program for Biomedical Ethics at Yale School of Medicine (currently co-Director), and Founding Director of the Yale Pediatric Ethics Program at Yale New Haven Children’s Hospital. He was formerly Chief of Neonatal-Perinatal Medicine at Yale, having stepped down from that role in 2022. Dr. Mercurio has for many years been active in neonatology and medical ethics education for residents, fellows, nurses, attending physicians, PA students,

medical students, and others. He has been a member of the medical faculty for the Fellowships at Auschwitz for the Study of Professional Ethics (FASPE) since 2010, is a former Chair of the American Academy of Pediatrics Section on Bioethics, and an original co-editor of the American Academy of Pediatrics Resident Curriculum in Bioethics.



Jennifer Miller, PhD – *Associate Professor of Medicine (General Medicine).*

Jennifer E. Miller, PhD, is Co-Director of the Program for Biomedical Ethics and an Associate Professor in Yale School of Medicine. She is also the Director of the Good Pharma Scorecard (an index that ranks and rates pharmaceutical companies on their bioethical performance) and Founder of the nonprofit Bioethics International. Her current research focuses on ethics, equity and governance in drug, vaccine, and medical device research, development, and accessibility as well as in the ethics of healthcare data sharing. She also specializes in developing and using metrics to enhance accountability and social responsibility in biomedical innovation. Prior to joining Yale’s faculty, she was an Assistant Professor

(tenure track) in NYU School of Medicine and completed training in physics, regulatory governance, bioethics, and ethics at Fordham University, Duke University, Regina Apostolorum Pontifical University, and Harvard University.



Kate Nyhan, MLS – *Research and Education Librarian for Public Health at the Cushing/Whitney Medical Library; Lecturer in Environmental Health Sciences at the Yale School of Public Health.*

Kate Nyhan is the research and education librarian for public health at Cushing/Whitney Medical Library and an expert in information retrieval and evidence synthesis. She works towards a world where everyone can participate in the scholarly conversation, as authors and as readers, without barriers: researchers, patients, advocates, and policymakers, across HIC/LMIC settings. As a liaison librarian, Kate works with Yale authors to help them understand their dissemination options and choose journals whose policies (regarding open access, article processing charges and waivers, and copyright) align with the authors' values and goals.



Reshma Ramachandran, MD, MPP, MHS – *Assistant Professor of Medicine (General Medicine)*. Reshma Ramachandran, MD, MPP, MHS is an Assistant Professor, board-certified family physician, and health services researcher. Her research focuses on the realignment of incentives for healthcare stakeholders including pharmaceutical companies, hospitals, and universities towards prioritizing equitable patient access to safe, effective health technologies. Dr. Ramachandran was trained in both medicine at the Alpert Medical School at Brown University and in public policy at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. She completed her family medicine residency at Kaiser Permanente Los Angeles Medical Center and a health services research and policy fellowship at the National Clinician Scholars Program at Yale. Previously, she served as the first PharmFree

Fellow with the American Medical Student Association focused on removing the undue influence of pharmaceutical companies on prescribing behavior and medical education. She is on the board of directors for the non-profit organization, Doctors for America.



Emma Rose – *Director, Fellowship Programs at Yale*.

Emma leads the Office of Fellowships, which is the hub of fellowship-related information, resources, education, and best practice guidelines for the Yale campus. During her time with the Office of Fellowships, she has advised thousands of students on summer and national fellowships, while also serving as a mentor and guide to the hundreds of fellowships administrators across the University. Emma has served as a member of Yale's Institutional Review Board panel for Social, Behavioral and Educational Research since 2014. Through her work in the Office of Fellowships, Emma has collaborated across the University to provide advising models and programming to help students plan and carry out

their research and independent experiences through an ethical engagement lens. Her professional interests include facilitating interdisciplinary collaboration, program design and development, and encouraging Yale students as they embark on a lifelong journey of cultural humility in their personal, academic, and professional experiences.



Patricia Ryan-Krause, MSN – *Associate Professor Emeritus of Nursing*. For the last 12 years Pat has been very involved with global health activities at YSN and in collaboration with the School of Public Health and the School of Medicine. Since 2008, she was the Interim Director of the Center for International Nursing Scholarship and Education and is now clinical coordinator of student projects abroad. Since 2008 she has traveled with masters and doctoral students to both Nicaragua and Dominican Republic where she has collaborated with community health workers to establish educational and capacity-building programs. She launched the global health concentration at YSN in 2014 to give interested students opportunities to gain additional knowledge

and experience with global populations.



Jason L. Schwartz, PhD– *Associate Professor of Public Health (Health Policy), Associate Professor in the History of Medicine, and Associate Professor in the Institution for Social and Policy Studies.* Jason L. Schwartz is an Associate Professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Yale School of Public Health. His research examines vaccines and vaccination policy, decision-making in medical regulation and public health policy, and the structure and function of scientific expert advice to government. The overall focus of his work is on the ways in which evidence is interpreted, evaluated, and translated into regulation and policy in medicine and public health. He holds a secondary appointment in the Section of the History of Medicine at the Yale School of Medicine and is also affiliated with Yale's Institution for Social and Policy Studies and

Program in the History of Science and Medicine.
